III. Our Response, Individually and as a Church – We Need to Carry this Scandal Biblically

Three preliminary comments

- A. This is a crisis of <u>credibility</u> rather than of <u>faith</u> for a "young" church
- B. An "image" within which to understand this crisis and what it is meant to teach the church and its clergy the "humiliation and purification" of Tobit
- C. "The church is justified, not because her children do not sin, but because they do." (Chesterton)

Some Guidelines for the Long Haul

- "Sometimes all you can do is to put your mouths to the dust and wait!" (Lamentations)
 - 1. Name this issue and all that it implies with honesty
 - 2. Our first and primary concern must be for the victims of abuse healing, not self-protection must be our essential intentionality
 - 3. Listen to the stories of the victims and accept the depth of their pain and accept their necessary anger.
 - 4. Accept that carrying this crisis is not a distraction to the real work of the church, it is the real work of the church.
 - 5. Accept this painful humiliation as a grace-opportunity
 - 6. Do not distance yourself personally from the issue
 - 7. "Singing a new song!" Practice compassion as God is compassionate, i.e., a compassion that extends to everyone, including the victimizer.
 - 8. "Ponder" as Mary did
 - 9. Re-affirm your faith in God.
 - 10. Wait patiently within the pain
